# Habitat Professionals Forum (HPF) Statement On COVID-19 Pandemic



Habitat Professionals Forum (HPF)<sup>1</sup> stands for advocacy and knowledge exchange, raising awareness, solidarity and support among professionals in this difficult time, and it is deeply concerned by the growing impacts and unintended social and economic consequences of COVID-19 pandemic crisis, which has revealed the fragility of urban and territorial systems and of our capacity for their management.

### Dear Human Settlements Professionals,

The Habitat Professionals Forum (HPF) wishes to recognize and extend gratitude to the front-line human settlement professionals who are protecting, supporting, and leading the world's population during the COVID-19 crisis. With their expertise in built form, land use, economic development, social equity, and environmental stewardship, they are well positioned to help rebuild and inclusively socialize local communities, settlements, cities, regions and territories during the COVID-19 recovery. The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the New Urban Agenda provide an effective framework for coordinating with the recovery efforts of professionals. This includes consideration of the challenges contributing to SDGs 3, 1, 6 and 11, and the Domains of Change of UN-Habitat's 2020-2023 strategic plan, particularly Domain of Change 1 (Reduced spatial inequality and poverty in communities across the urban-rural continuum) and Domain of Change 4 (Effective urban crisis prevention and response).

Over the last month, HPF conducted a survey amongst its members on the effect of the COVID-19 pandemic on achieving resilient human settlements. Responses received, representing thousands of professionals around the globe, highlighted the need for:

- Efficient and effective healthcare and health-related systems and organizations to serve the inhabitants of cities and territories, particularly low-income and excluded populations.
- Greater research and leadership regarding resilience, local economic development, improvement of the global economic structure, and better understanding of the domain of built environment, spatial form, and public health in relation to the COVID-19 crisis.
- Learning from history and heritage, drawing on traditional knowledge, historic urban systems and culturally-sensitive management approaches to ensure fully informed, resilient and efficient outcomes in the recovery and 'build-back-better' processes.
- Emphasis and attention to the role of technology and smart cities in territorial and urban planning, design, health, communication, with a focus on interactions with and between cities and between citizens, taking into consideration citizen rights, public space and public transport management.
- A review of housing standards, logistic and basic services management, financial support to
  economic sectors etc., and of the effectiveness and efficiency of urban planning standards and
  principles (density, urban design, urban system, especially for public transport hubs, commercial
  centers, slums, confined spaces, etc.).

In response to these concerns, HPF will develop *a <u>Roadmap document</u>* offering guiding principles on how to build resilience, respond, and recover during and after a pandemic, and will:

- Disseminate key messages and solutions through their professional and international networks regarding the impacts of the epidemic and effective response and recovery.
- Invite international networks of public health professionals and of epidemiologists, and organizations of the urban poor and related networks to join the HPF.
- Continue to use technology to mobilize its international networks to activate new concepts and best practices in human settlements and cities facing epidemics and other crises, including climate change.
- Propose to lead a task force by Habitat Professionals that will provide both high-level and contextspecific recommendations to city managers, regions and state governments regarding city resilience in the age of epidemics and climate emergencies.

These actions will support the Campaign "Take Action with Us in Cities and Communities" and the <u>UN-Habitat Covid-19 Response Plan</u> working to assist cities, regional and national governments in building resilience. They will also complement the just launched 'Sourcebook on Integrating Health in Urban and Territorial Planning (UN-Habitat and WHO).

The HPF encourages and supports all professionals globally to participate, contribute and engage with all the initiatives taken by professional organizations seeking solutions for the pandemic crisis. We trust that you will join us in this process.
